From Your Pastor

Christmas decorations, Christmas concerts, Christmas shopping specials, Christmas music—we can't escape it—our attention is driven to focus upon Christmas, which, as I print this article is one month away. But wait! (Such an irritating and revolting word!) We follow a different calendar. Yes, certainly Christmas is a month away, but first The Church Year Calendar blesses us with the gift of Advent.

Advent is a four-week season that focuses on coming. In fact, the word "Advent" means coming. Particularly, the four weeks before Christmas are used as a time dedicated to the thoughtful, prayerful, preparation to celebrate Jesus' first coming in His birth, a season which also has in longer focus Jesus' second coming at the end of time.

The Church Year then, and the season of Advent particularly, refuses to rush. Just the opposite—Advent calls us to wait! Advent calls us to watch, to prepare, to long, to hope. Advent directs us to slow down that our hearts and minds may prayerfully and repentantly reflect on why Jesus had to come in the first place: "to save His people from their sins" (Matthew 1:21).

We live in a time that has nearly erased the word wait from our vocabulary. Packages we order arrive very quickly. People living in close proximity to Amazon distribution centers may even receive their package the same day! Answers appear instantly on our screens with a tap or swipe. We are being trained to expect immediacy—and so, we are negatively conditioned to grow anxious, frustrated, or even despairing when our desires are not met on demand. And then comes Advent. Not only is wait not erased, but **WAIT** is written in big, bold, letters.

Please note: it is the world around us that is driving us to hurry; it is the Word of the Lord that calls us to wait. This tension brings Advent's riches into clear focus: the story of God's people has always been one of waiting—not passive waiting, but faithful, watchful, hope-anchored, waiting. God's Old Testament people waited for centuries upon centuries for the promised Savior to arrive. Zechariah and Elizabeth (and countless generations) waited for answered prayer. Mary waited in

expectation as she conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and the promised Child within her grew. And now we wait for Christ to return, even as we confess that He has already come and comes to us daily through His Word and comes to us through the Sacrament of Holy Communion. Throughout the changing seasons of life we are called to wait upon the Lord and the fulfilling of His promises.

But it is hard. Waiting clearly reveals we are not in control. It surfaces anxiety, restlessness, and the aching guilt of unfinished things. It is good that the Holy Spirit calls to us in this reflective waiting to turn from our sins, or we will just keep hurrying on our way pretending everything is O.K., when it is not, for we are often rushing away from our Savior rather than toward Him.

Allow the Holy Spirit to do this work to draw You to the One who came to be our Savior, to meet us with His forgiving grace and every gift for our deep waits for healing, for reconciliation, for clarity, for stability, for answers to prayers long prayed. In Advent God is calling us from the pressure to "fix it now" and redirecting our gaze to the God who comes precisely to those who wait in hope. His timing is perfect. He is never forced by the speed of our world. God is patient with us. Advent is our reminder that waiting is not failure, it is a formation as we wait upon our Lord, who always delivers for our saving good.

Join us for our midweek Advent worship! Allow these weeks of Advent to slow you down, deepen your longing for Christ's daily coming for you, and anchor you again the promise that Christ has come, Christ is coming, and Christ will come again.

As these special seasons of Thanksgiving and Christmas approach, we rejoice in God's wonderful gift of salvation through Jesus! We also thank God for YOU and the work He has accomplished through

Because you have helped to send and support missionaries, last Christmas Eve 120 people on a beach in the Cayman Islands heard the true meaning of Christmas; and a 77-year-old man in Belize was invited to church for the very first time in his life; and unchurched people in Panama learned of Jesus in Vacation Bible School; and 54 ostracized albino children no longer live in a Tanzanian government institution with 500 others, but in a family-like group setting where they experience the love of Christ. Also, 100 participants from all over Cambodia (a nation that is only 2% Christian) received and studied their very own Bibles at our first ever national youth gathering there. Pray for these youth to be powerful witnesses to their Buddhist families. And more than 2,000 middle school students in Chiayi, <u>Taiwan</u> were taught Bible stories at Concordia Middle School. Only 1% of these students are Christian when they enroll, but over 10% are Christian when they graduate. One day these very children will celebrate with us around the throne of Jesus.

As we listen to these and other stories of our missionaries, we realize that there is a worldwide famine of God's truth. In some places, Christianity is completely unknown. In others, it is violently suppressed or mixed with pagan religions practices. In many, God's truth is distorted by false prophets adding requirements to God's forgiveness, or denying clear counter-cultural teachings of Scripture, or even preaching a fabricated gospel of earthly riches. Friends, we have the truth of God's Word and through your generosity our missionaries are proclaiming that truth—all over the world! As we send you this one and only annual mailing, we are deeply grateful to God for you in helping to make this vital work possible!



For the first time, my family is experiencing what I'm certain many of you have already gone through: my mother, Esther Schlesselman, died just before Christmas at age 88 following a valiant 2 ½ year battle with cancer. Mom lived out her quiet, confident faith until her last breath – with a beautiful long life and a peaceful passing into heaven that my sisters and I were blessed to intimately share. We are so sad as we grieve, yet confident in God's promise to her—to us—of the sure and certain hope of eternal life with Him through Jesus who conquered death.

My mom made it easy. We now have things to do to settle her estate, including distributing important family keepsakes. But no conflict. Mom wouldn't want us to fuss or struggle. In death as in life, she made everything easy for us. She had her funeral planned with each hymn selected. She had names taped to the back of special glass dishes and books. And she had all our family pictures sorted into three boxes, one for each of her daughters. But most importantly, she had written a statement of her faith which, along with her will, leaves a testimony to us of what was most important to her in life. She wanted her family to be reminded one last time of the source of the love that holds us together as a family: our faith in God through Jesus. I'm so thankful that God chose her to be my mom.

What are you leaving behind? As you're reading this today, I invite you to take my perspective as a grieving child and consider my mom's example in your own life. Do you have a will? Have you written a statement of your faith that will bring comfort and blessing to your family when God calls you home? What will they find that can direct and comfort them as they figure out how to go on in life without you?

I'm now doing this for my family and encouraging you to do the same. We at Lutheran Family Service are here to help you through this process, if needed. First, if you could use some guidance in thinking through things before putting them in writing or in preparing for conversations with your family, please call us. If you have concerns about your relationship with family members, friends, or God that still need resolution on this side of eternity, please call us. If you're seeking how to organize and communicate your plan to distribute the resources God has given you to steward, we can help with that, too. We can provide ideas for ways to structure your will so that the family, church, and ministries you love are all blessed through your planning. What a good feeling it will be to have all that taken care of for those you love.

Tomorrow isn't guaranteed. Do these things today while you can. Don't put them off until it's too late. It may seem hard, but you're not alone. And like me today, I know those you love will be ever so grateful when the day comes for them to face life without you.
