From Your Pastor

"I don't feel like praying, worshiping, or reading the Bible. What should I do?" This describes one battle with which I imagine each and every Chrisian is familiar. It really reflects a dominant theme in our culture: "If it feels good, do it." The opposite, of course, is "If it doesn't feel good, don't do it." Upon reflection, however, we recognize this is idolatry—fearing, loving, and trusting our feelings above all things. It is a dangerous lie that leads only to trouble and heartache.

Imagine how little good would actually occur if everyone merely followed their feelings. I think it safe to say that the vast majority of adults would never go to work, the great majority of students would never go to school, and most people would never sacrifice anything in love for another. Here's an example: consider how much parents—contrary to their feelings—do for their children. I doubt if the average parent really feels like waking from peaceful slumber at 2 a.m. to feed the screaming little tyke! So, why do they? It is simply a matter of the will. Love gives, even when it doesn't feel like it.

"But what if I don't really want to?" This is where we see just how deeply our natural, sinful, self really digs in and sets itself against our God and what He wants for us! We begin to see that our sinful nature ways really don't work. We see we don't have problems as much as we ARE the problem. Bottom line: I must admit that my sinful nature doesn't want to worship, pray, or read. My sinful nature doesn't want any part of God! It wants its own way!

Well then, what can we do? It should be painfully obvious by now that we can't do anything. But that is a very good place to be. To be empty, depleted, and powerless makes it clear to us that if something is going to happen, it is going to be by God's might. With God all things are possible! Paul tells us in Philippians 2:13, "It is God who works in you to will and to act according to His good purpose." The Psalm writer put it this way: "Delight yourself in the Lord and He will give you

the desires of your heart" (Psalm 37:4). More than once many believers have prayed: "Lord give me the want to. Give me the desires to do such and such." God is faithful. He will reshape our desires, our wants, even to the point that doing what He wants for us feels good!

The feelings of not wanting what God wants for us can also lead us to some other uncomfortable feelings. Maybe you don't feel much like a Christian. Then remember that our faith is dependent upon some very real life facts, not feelings. Christ died for us (Rom. 5:8). The Holy Spirit dwells within us (1 Cor. 6:19). We have been baptized (Rom. 6:3). We are in Christ (Rom. 8:1). We are dearly loved children of God (1 John 3:1). We are complete in Him (Col 2:10). But these truths are so easy to forget. It is so easy to focus on our feelings, or even our faith, rather than on Jesus. We also need to beware of putting our faith in our faith, which will only lead ether to pride or to despair. Again, look to Jesus and not to yourself. Through Jesus, you and I are worthy and can approach the throne of God with confidence.


And there are others who need you! Others need to see that God can be honored, Jesus can be exalted, and people can still love, even in the midst of horrible, agonizing pain. Others in the church need you and your gifts and encouragement! With all others we, too, need to experience our Savior's presence in Word and Sacrament.

All our *I don't want to* feelings come from Satan himself. We are under attack, but the battle belongs to the Lord! Call upon the Lord Jesus and He will deliver you. He will feed you through the very Word and Sacrament. Ask Him to fight for you! Seek His nourishment and His transforming work in His Word. Seek His presence in prayer. Seek His fellowship with His people. Bathe your wounds in His forgiveness. And do this all the more as your feelings tell you otherwise.

Immanuel Lutheran Church Voter's Meeting Minutes July 13, 2025

41 Voting Members in Attendance

Opening Devotion and Prayer

Led by Pastor Mahnken

II. Reading/Approval of Minutes and Agenda

The agenda for today and the minutes from April were both approved.

III. Reports of Officers and Boards

A. Elders (Curtis Korner)

Community Outreach did a grill out for the Youth Rec Program & it was well attended. Delinquent members are still being reached out to.

B. Trustees (Dave Friedrichsen)

Juan Ornelas (Innovation Construction) installed new flooring, did some painting, as well as other miscellaneous improvements in the Education Unit. The bill was in the vicinity of \$30,000. Trustees are asking for a breakdown of services and corresponding charges.

Andrew Tuckpointing from Clarinda came and gave an assessment and made some repair recommendations. The cost of these was \$12,537. The radon ventilation system at the parsonage is not functioning. There is a bid of \$2,091 to replace the fan and reroute the venting. The trustees are pursuing a most cost effective solution.

The soot issue is still being investigated. The Eternal candle is now electric vs. oil. Stanley Steamer gave a duct cleaning quote of \$16,000+. No action was taken on this.

C. Treasurer/Stewardship/Finance (Leroy Hight)

Immanuel is currently blessed to be ahead \$15,147.81 for the year.

D. Education/Youth (Deb Green)

Angie Ellis' term will be up and a replacement will be needed.

Confirmation Orientation will be held on August 20th. The 5th and 6th Grade confirmation classes will be split due to large class sizes.

E. Preschool (Angie Ellis)

The A.M. preschool sessions are full while the P.M. session has 1 opening at present.

F. Mission/Fellowship (Chris Mahnken)

Chris thanked those who supported fundraising efforts that allowed the Mission Board to fund various missionaries and worthwhile projects (Orphan Grain Train, LCMS Disaster Relief, Bible translators, etc.)

G. Memorial (No report)

H. Pastor's Report (Pastor Mahnken)

Pastor shared statistical data about Immanuel. Leroy Hight accompanied Pastor Mahnken to the IDW convention.

Over \$20,000 was raised to support endeavors at Camp Okoboji.

A. New Constitution for Immanuel

B. Other

It was moved by Peggy Wunschel, seconded by Dave Friedrichsen, and approved unanimously to purchase Val Teut a \$100 gift card to Phil's Lawn & Landscaping to show our appreciation for her years of service to Immanuel.

V. New Business

A. New Computers for Church Office

Windows 10 will no longer be supported and the current computers cannot be updated to the new software

The Council recommends using Choice Dollars and Office Supply Account funds to purchase 3 new office computers.

BT Computers has been very good to Immanuel and we would like to keep doing business with them. The cost will be approximately \$3,000. Lowell Lee made a motion to make this purchase. Deb Green provided the second, and the vote was unanimous.

B. Church Roof Repair

Curtis Korner made a motion to have Andrew Tuckpointing make all necessary repairs, even if they find something new that they did not catch during their initial inspection. Rachel Mentink provided the second and the vote was unanimous.

C. Friends of the Lutheran Hour

A motion was made by Dennis Gierstorf to donate \$1,100 to Lutheran Hour Ministries from Home Missions. Deb Green provided a second, and the vote was unanimous. The funds are needed now rather than later so a door offering may be done to replenish the HMF if deemed necessary.

D. Other

- Church History: Nancy Bielenberg talked about former congregations near Schleswig and the importance of keeping their histories available. Specifically, Grant Township, St. Paul's, and St. Luke's congregations.
- Maria Valdez asked permission to have a school supply drive and was granted permission to do so. She also talked about foster care and an initiative called Foster Care Sundays. She will talk about this with Pastor Mahnken to see if it is something Immanuel will participate in.
- 3. The radon issue at the parsonage is a timely one. If it can not be fixed by the Immanuel trustees, it doesn't make sense to wait until October, our next Voters' Meeting, to address it again. Peggy Wunschel moved, Loren Jepsen provided a second and the vote was unanimous to authorize the trustees to pay to have it repaired.
- An interesting discussion was held about working at the Lutheran Hour Ministries booth at the Iowa State Fair. No action was taken on this matter.

VI. Adjourn With Prayer

Pastor Mahnken led us in a closing prayer!

Pastor Mahnken's Report Voters' Meeting—July 13, 2025

We began 2025 with 615 baptized members and 515 communicant members on the books. In 2025 three of our members have died-Lainev Naberhaus. Bernie Petersen. and **Bonard** Christiansen. Six members were added by Holy Baptism; the Naberhaus twins were baptized by a hospital chaplain. One member transferred in. We have transferred one communicant member to another LCMS congregation. One member was released by personal request. As of today we 617 baptized members communicant members on our roll.

Our average attendance to date is 144.4; a year ago it was 148.7. Our average is probably a few less, as the numbers were from June 22, and since then we have had 103, 114, and today 141 in worship.

Our Iowa District West Convention was held June 8-10 at Camp Okoboji. We thank Leroy Hight for serving as our voting, lay delegate, joining me at the convention. The theme of the convention was One Generation Commends Your Mighty Acts to Another, based on Psalm145:4-7. It was an appropriate theme as our District President, the Reverend Steve Turner, has now retired. Our new District President is the Reverend Paul Egger, formerly pastor of St. John in Galva. The Office of District President in Iowa District West is a fulltime position. The Office of 1st Vice President (VP) and 2nd (VP) are part-time positions, and so, the pastors elected to these two positions continue to serve in a congregation. Pastor Jonathan Riggert of Trinity Lutheran Church in Cherokee has been elected to be our 1st V.P., and Pastor Benjamin Dose of Immanuel Lutheran Church in Spirit Lake has been elected to be our 2nd V.P.

Synodical President the Reverend Doctor Matthew Harrison was the preacher for our opening service, and he addressed convention twice on Monday. The Convention Offering was designated for Camp Okoboji, and the offering received at the Convention totaled over \$20,000!

The Convention itself was a very peaceful convention. A fun feature was a Monday evening celebration of the faithful services of retiring President Turner and also Sue Light, who served as an Administrative Assistant at the Iowa District West Office for 46 years, as well as Jim Schroeder who retired from serving as the LCMS Foundation

Planned Giving Counselor for Iowa District West and the Nebraska District. Jim served in that position for 37 years. We thank God for their faithful service!

Chris and I attended the Lutheran Women's Missionary League National Convention in Omaha June 26-29. Several other women of Immanuel attended. It was an excellent convention and vey well run. I am thankful we had the opportunity to attend so close to home. You can view videos of the Convention online: lwml.org/live. I particularly encourage you to watch the Opening Service and the Bible Study which was part of the Friday 8 a.m. and Saturday 8:30 a.m. sessions. The Mites in Action speakers all have a good witness to share as well.

Sunday, June 29 Pastor Jeffrey Wade was installed as the Pastor of Zion Lutheran Church in Denison. I was honored with the task of preaching for the service. For some reason, people often ask where he came from. He had been serving in Michigan. He has been a pastor for 11 years. Pastor Wade and his wife Christine have three children living with them and two living with Jesus in heaven. Pastor Wade and his wife both grew up in Ohio.

Finally, I ask that you please continue to pray the Lord would bless us with the working of His Holy Spirit through His Word-all of us, no matter what our age. Pray for your spouse, pray for your children and grandchildren, pray for one another as fellow members of Immanuel, and pray for those you know who do not have saving faith. Pray as St. Paul prays in our Epistle for today: "We have not ceased to pray for you, asking that you may be filled with the knowledge of His will in all spiritual wisdom and understanding, so as to walk in a manner worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to Him, bearing fruit in every good work and increasing in the knowledge of God. May you be strengthened with all power, according to His glorious might, for all endurance and patience with joy, giving thanks to the Father, who has qualified you to share in the inheritance of the saints in light" (Colossians 1:9-12). This is another wonderful example of how we can take a prayer found in the Bible and easily adapt it for use in our own prayers.

The baby is absolutely charming with blue eyes and a dimple that will someday be used to his advantage. The lessons learned for preschool through these little tykes has been amazing.

The most profound and applicable thing I learned from the two year old. They repeat everything they hear! Of course, she's not speaking in complete sentences yet so it was usually a one word repeat, but she doesn't miss a thing. Nothing melts your heart like hearing your grandchild say Jesus." As I reflected on her skill level (because I'm an early childhood educator so it just comes naturally), I was again reminded that what we teach at preschool is so incredibly valuable. The children are sponges. They are absorbing every tidbit shared at school. We have this incredible opportunity to share the love of a Savior with them each and every day. I feel like it comes across twofold. One, children can tell when they are loved. They'll learn if they know they're loved. Second, they get to hear how much Jesus loves them and have the Word poured into them. God's Word does not return void. It's up to the Holy Spirit when He wants to pull it out and apply it to their lives. I am so grateful for those opportunities and pray each child becomes rooted and grounded in Jesus' love this year.

As always, your prayers are welcomed and appreciated. They are the plow that prepares the spiritual ground for the children. I'd ask specifically for the children and their families. Pray that we can minister to both in whatever capacity God chooses. Prayers for patience as we begin a new year (it's always an adjustment because your head knows they are new students but your brain is somehow deceived into thinking they'll be as advanced as the children who just left for kindergarten.) I have no idea how, but I seem to always forget the three year olds have no idea what a line actually is or what it means to stay "behind" the person in front of you.

The Spirit clearly worked in this encounter, bringing comfort to his soul and joy to the team. A crusade and church plant in Gbojay is under prayerful consideration.

We are saved!: My name is Martina Stem, and I am thankful that Jesus saved my sister and I through the preaching on the radio programs. 


