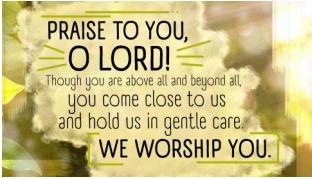

From Your Pastor

“How long, O Lord!” The Psalm writer’s cry is often on our hearts and lips as we trust in the Lord and wait upon Him to fulfill His promises in our lives. Here is one of those passages: “How long, O Lord? Will You forget me forever? How long will You hide Your face from me? How long must I wrestle with my thoughts and every day have sorrow in my heart?” (Psalm 13:1-2).

In our society of quick fixes we are an impatient people. Microwaves heat our food in seconds—unless we just hit the drive-through, pills remove our headaches within minutes, and we have instant messaging. We have the audacity to demand that God quickly attend to our needs and desires in the same way.

This leads to another fascinating observation about Jesus. Jesus never seemed to be in a hurry. Do you ever remember a time when Jesus was running? John 11:3-6 tells us a most revealing account on this point. “So, the sisters sent word to Jesus, ‘Lord, the one You love is sick.’ When He heard this, Jesus said, ‘This sickness will not end in death. No, it is for God’s glory so that God’s Son may be glorified through it.’ Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus. Yet when He heard that Lazarus was sick, He stayed where He was two more days.” Those must have been agonizingly long days for the sisters. You probably recall the rest of the story. Lazarus dies and Jesus eventually raises him from the dead.

This account teaches us that God moves on a different timetable than you and I do. He knows what you and I do not know—the rest of the story! Like Mary and Martha, we can’t see into the future. We are short-sighted and narrow-minded. It would be helpful for us to remind ourselves of this from time to time. God’s timetable is often too slow for our comfort, but it is always for our good.

A second lesson is a most amazing sequence inserted in the middle of this account. Between where Jesus is summoned and when He finally travels to their home, we read these words, “Jesus

loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus.” From their perspective God is doing nothing. To them He appears to be silent, unresponsive, uncaring, and seemingly unloving. But that is not what the Word tells us. God’s Word tells us plainly, Jesus loves them, even in His delaying. Be assured, He loves you, even as you wait and He is silent.

A third lesson is the point behind the smaller story. The smaller story, of course, is that Lazarus is dying. I know that doesn’t seem small and I’m sure it didn’t seem minor to Martha or Mary or especially to Lazarus! But we are told the reason for the sickness, “It is for God’s glory, so that God’s Son may be glorified through it.” That is a pretty big story in which to be cast as a character! Martin Luther said we should make our will depend on the will of God. If the help we desire does not serve God’s glory, or is not helpful to our salvation, we should be glad to bear the cross longer.

What are you enduring right now? We do not know how much longer we have to endure. What we do know is that He knows how long, and He knows exactly what He is doing for our good and His glory. And, He loves us!

The answer the Word of God gives to the question “How long?” is a recurring refrain: “Wait for the Lord; be strong and take heart and wait for the Lord” (Psalm 27:14). Remember that cry of Psalm 13:1? David cried, “How long, O Lord? Will You forget me forever?” But the Psalm ends just five short verses later, when he says, “But I trust in Your unfailing love; my heart rejoices in Your salvation. I will sing to the Lord for He has been good to me” (13:5-6). When we think we are at our breaking point and can’t take it any more, yet, we can, for in the midst of all those powerful feelings, we trust in God’s unfailing love for us through Jesus our Savior!

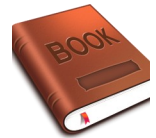

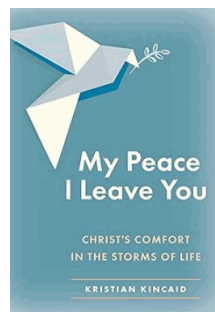


Deaths: "I am the Resurrection..."

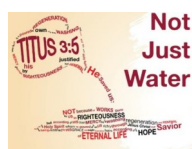

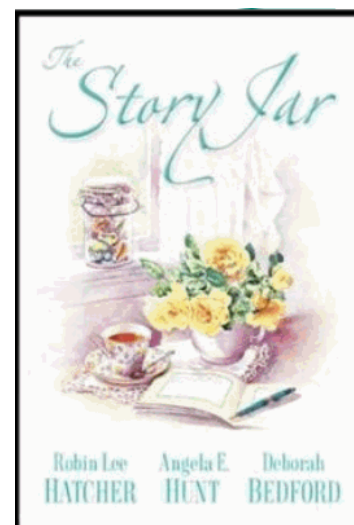
The Story Jar By Robin Lee Hatcher

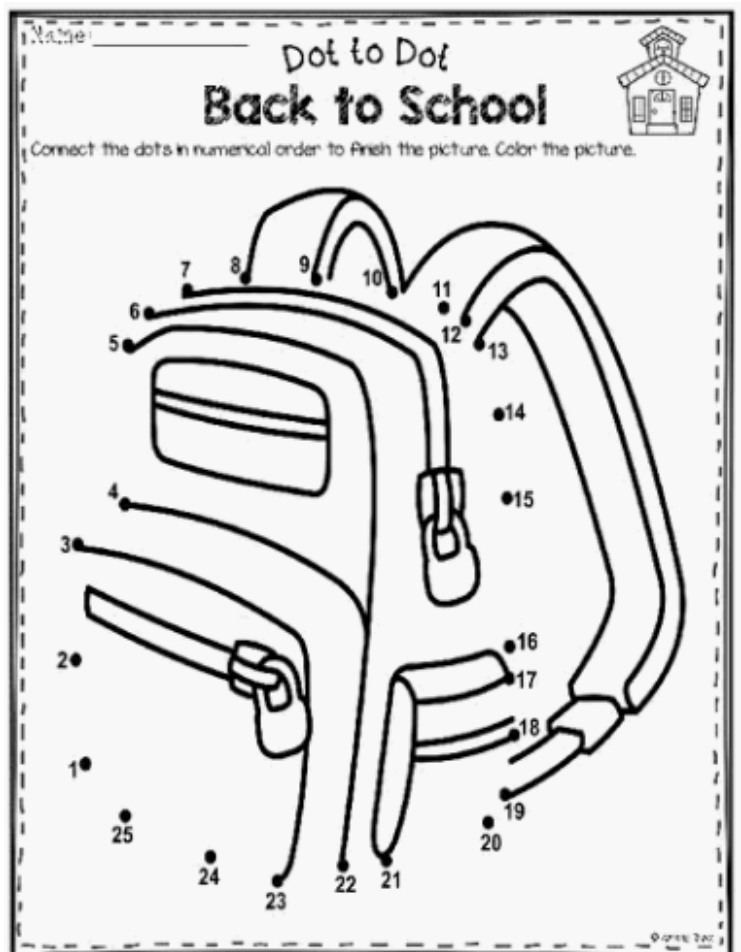

We have had a blessed summer that has gone so quickly but have served with gladness. I, together with 3 of my deacons participated in our District Convention. Paquita participated in the LWML Convention in Omaha and what an experience again for her, unfortunately with work schedules and members vacation plans she could not bring anyone with her. We must plan for next time to bring people to the next convention.

We are grateful to St. Paul-Carroll who made it possible for us to take 3 of our youth to the National Youth Convention in New Orleans. A FRESH THEME FOR THE LUTHERAN HOUR

With The Lutheran Hour now available on a multitude of online platforms beyond traditional radio, people everywhere are being reached weekly with Christ's messages of love and hope.

Rev. Dr. Michael Zeigler has an extensive sermon series planned for the balance of the 2025 broadcast season, which ends in late August. It will explore the Gospel of John.

Upcoming guest speakers are familiar to the program's audience. They will include Rev. Dr. Daniel Paavola, Rev. Dr. Jason Broge, Rev. Keith Habersack (Lutheran Church-Canada), and Rev. Dr. Matthew C. Harrison (President of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod).



National POW/MIA Recognition Day was established in 1979 through a proclamation signed by President Jimmy Carter. Since then, each subsequent president has issued an annual proclamation commemorating the third Friday in September as National POW/MIA Recognition Day.

POW/MIA Day and Capitol Run: Each year on the third Friday of September, Detachment 250 commemorates National Prisoner of War/Missing in Action Day. The entire day is dedicated to honoring and remembering those men and women who have yet to return home. Early morning of POW/MIA day, a group of cadets travels to the Iowa statehouse in Des Moines to begin the memorial POW/MIA run. During the run, our national flag and the POW/MIA flag will be continuously carried nearly 35 miles from the capitol to Iowa State University.

Back at the university in the Gold Star Hall in the Memorial Union, members of the honor guard will stand guard at a memorial display throughout the day, reminding students of the sacrifices of previous servicemen and women. Finally at the close of business, all of Detachment 250 forms up on central campus to conduct a Retreat ceremony at the campus flag pole. POW/MIA day is an important way for us to ensure that our country's missing heroes are never forgotten.

THE POW/MIA TABLE

A Place Setting For One, A Table For All

The tradition of setting a separate table in honor of our prisoners of war and missing comrades has been in place since the end of the Vietnam War. The manner in which this table is decorated is full of special symbols to help us remember our brothers and sisters in arms.

The POW/MIA table is separate from the others and can be set for one to four place settings to represent each service participating in the event.

The table is smaller than the others
symbolizing the frailty of one prisoner alone against his or her oppressors.

The white tablecloth
draped over the table represents the purity of their response to our country's call to arms.

The empty chair
depicts an unknown face, representing no specific Soldier, Sailor, Airman, or Marine, but all who are not here with us.

The round table
shows that our concern for them is never ending.

The Bible
represents faith in a higher power and the pledge to our country, founded as one nation under God.

The black napkin
stands for the emptiness these warriors have left in the hearts of their families and friends. A Purple Heart medal can be pinned to the napkin.

The single red rose
reminds us of their families and loved ones. The red ribbon represents the love of our country, which inspired them to answer the nation's call.

The yellow candle and its ribbon
symbolize the everlasting hope for a joyous reunion with those yet accounted for.

The slices of lemon
on the bread plate remind us of their bitter fate.

The salt upon the bread plate
represent the tears of their families.

The inverted wine glass
reminds us that our distinguished comrades cannot be with us to drink a toast or join in the festivities of the evening.
